

Freedom in Christ

Freedom in Christ is a 12 week discipleship course, with the option of an away day. It is designed to help Christians take hold of the truth of who they are in Christ, and equip them to live in the freedom that Jesus brings.

Each session includes a simple time of worship, some teaching material, and opportunities to pause for thought as individuals, and in small groups, in a safe, no pressure environment. The course sets out to:

- Explain the amazing truths of what Jesus has done in a way that Christians can “connect” with and integrate into their daily life
- Help believers understand the nature of the spiritual battle they are now in and equip them to overcome the world, and the evil in it.
- Help believers take hold of the authority they now have in Christ to resolve personal and spiritual conflicts
- Equip Christians to take personal responsibility for continuing to live in the freedom gained so that they go on to maturity and bear fruit.

Well St. Church, Buckingham

Well Street United Church is a local ecumenical partnership (LEP) which was formed in 1985 when the Methodist & United Reformed Churches agreed to unite. In 2003 the Baptist union were welcomed into the LEP.

In the 1990s the church experienced significant growth and realised that the property in Well Street was simply too small to house the congregation. Over the ensuing years, two major attempts have been made to find more suitable premises.

The first proposal was to purchase a former print works in Well Street which would have provided a large meeting area, space for children and youth, living accommodation for the minister and parking space. Unfortunately the valuation of the building was not satisfactory and the project was abandoned.

The second attempt was to employ 1Church100 Uses, a professional group linked to URC, to help us explore possibilities within the town. Again this proved fruitless.

Last year the trustees were advised that the building in Well Street did not meet current fire safety regulations and that if we were to continue using the building we would have to impose strict limits on the number of people in the church at any one time (c60). The alternative was to spend significant monies on alterations to the building. These alterations would have allowed us to increase the capacity to c100 but would have not solved some of the other inherent problems e.g. access, parking, inability to accommodate whole congregation.

Although in the middle of an interregnum, Rev Steve Fisher having

moved in November, the elders were unanimous in believing that we could no longer put off the decision to move from Well Street. One of the main objectives being a desire to re-unite the church. Our 3 service structure, (9.30 family service, 11.15 traditional service, 6.00 contemporary service) had in reality almost developed into 3 different congregations sharing one building.

A church meeting in April approved the move and since the beginning of May we have moved to a single Sunday service at the Royal Latin School.

Over the first 3 months our average congregation has been around 140 which is roughly the same number of people as attended the 3 services. Sadly some have found the change too difficult and have chosen to worship elsewhere, although this has been bal-

anced by new people joining us.

At the outset we stressed that to come back together as one family would require grace and patience particularly as we seek to establish a distinctive pattern of worship. The intention has always been to create a style of worship suitable for the whole family rather than replicating the style of one of the previous 3 services.

Children & Youth work have more space but still have the perennial problem of shortage of helpers.

As we settle into our temporary home, we continue to look for a site for a permanent home and alongside that the recruitment of a Baptist minister to replace Steve Fisher.
